It is a truism of postmodern thought that there is no TRUTH, only your truth and my truth – according to our personal, subjective perspectives. Jilly has asked me to write up a personal reflection of the events of the Reunion. And so I give you my postmodern best, the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the postmodern truth - give or take a few lapses and eccentricities.

When one gets older, as even Goats sometimes do, the maxim is that everything takes longer. Is it not sad that growing old itself does not take longer? Why do the three year intervals between Reunions not take longer? Why do the years flash by so quickly, so it almost seems like we have Reunions every year?

For older Goats like me, attending Reunions from the other side of the earth takes more planning than it used to, and wider latitude for mistakes. I made careful lists of what I needed to pack into a suitcase which I would have to carry up and down many stairs once I arrived in the London subways. The Regent's Park station has 38 stairs beyond where the elevators take you and, if the elevators are not working, the 200 plus stairs require Olympic training to get to ground level. The Great Portland Street station is just as bad, originally designed, it is said, for mountain climbers under the age of 25. I found the trick to deal with stairs was to really bungle the first couple of steps, and beautiful and strong young women would take pity and hoist my case to the top. I actually learned this trick from Gwyn Price-Evans when I was much younger, in my seventies. Gwyn and I were flat mates during the Reunion.



So my planning included coming to the Reunion a week early, in case I got delayed or lost in the subway, or somehow lost my appeal to beautiful strong, young women who would carry my luggage. Fortunately everything worked out well, especially the luggage, and I had ample time to adjust to the new time zone and then to visit with old friends, like Jim O'Gorman, who kindly invited me down to Chertsey and a cruise on his boat up the Thames. Unfortunately, the boat lost its steering, but Jim proved masterful in getting the stricken vessel through locks and back to its moorage safely, helped by beautiful, strong young women whom I was able to attract by holding up my luggage. I never go anywhere now without my luggage. We had a lovely lunch on Jim's boat, and he bought some new luggage on the way home. Some of this is true only in the postmodern sense, but it's what I remember.

After a week in ISH, impressed by the beautiful renovations, welcomed warmly by Jilly, and befriended by the new Chief **Executive, Martin Chalker, breakfasting** at The Thirsty Scholar, I concluded that the House was in excellent shape.

Even though the elevators were still under renovation and I was on the fifth floor, I felt it was time to stop carrying around my luggage and put away the empty case.

The reunion officially began Wednesday, 27 June, with the **Dean of Student Life's Reception**. It was apparent soon, with the quality of food and drink and speeches, that the new Dean was as articulate, generous, sincere, and sober as the old. We all had a grand time greeting and checking out old friends, catching up on news, and trying to remember everyone's name. Thank goodness for the labels.

The next morning, Thursday, brought the first visitation on the Reunion program - to **Guildhall**. Alas, despite my careful planning, I had the wrong time by half an hour for the departure of the bus. I found myself running after the bus, unsuccessfully, as it was just pulling away. This was embarrassing; but it was encouraging to find out I could still run. I contented myself with the memory of previous visits to Guildhall. Having missed the visit, I won't say much, but those who were there will remember the ancient Roman, Saxon and Medieval origins of Guildhall, and its magnificent Great Hall and which derives from the 15th century. Guildhall serves as the ceremonial centre for London's government, and we all know that British government is about 90% ceremony. Most important, the bar at Guildhall serves the cheapest drinks in the City, about 60p per shot, due to high subsidization. But you have to be a member, or a guest of a member. Perhaps this is why Guildhall was the earliest site of London tax collection.

After the tour of Guildhall, Goats were free to explore, which many did, to their advantage. Others chose to come back to ISH and sleep, which many more did to

their advantage.

In the evening we had the Mary Trevelyan Lecture, where Gill Hammond, Director of the Bank of England's Centre for Central Banking Studies and Vice Chair of ISH Trustees, advised us on the current efforts of the Bank and its Governor. Mark Carney (Canada's most notable recent export) on how to inform the public on the operations of the Bank. She explored why bureaucracies in the UK and the EU have to be more transparent in helping to educate the public and aspiring central bankers properly. She was quite optimistic on this, despite some counter-factual evidence in recent UK voting, not to mention America. Anyway, she was still optimistic that transparency would prevail over false news and, if it didn't, she would still play tennis every morning.



Goats slept well overnight, especially those who had not slept all afternoon, and were prepared for the Fellowship **Breakfast** the next morning, Friday. Here, after a superb British breakfast full of eggs, sausages, toast, butter, jams, champagne, coffee, tea and orange juice, Yusuf Kaplan, Interfaith Advisor at the University of Westminster, spoke of growing inequalities in the world, of social justice, of the values shared by all religions, and of the need for greater diversity and inclusion. This made some Goats feel a little guilty, but we soon recovered by remembering the core mission of the Goats and ISH, and that we could all make our contribution to diversity by just being ourselves at bit more intensively.

Interfaith thoughts remained on our minds as we boarded the bus for a tour of London's Neasden Hindu Temple, with a required dress code 'covering upper arms, shoulders, chest and knees', making respectful bows out of the bus windows to synagogues, mosques, abandoned churches, and godless shrines of capitalism along the route. The dress code didn't say what to wear between the chest and the knees, but no one was arrested while bowing and everyone made it through the Temple's rigorous security check.

The Hindu Temple, the largest outside India, was amazingly beautiful, built with skillful and dedicated carvers in India, using vast supplies of Burmese teak and equally vast stores of Italian marble and Bulgarian limestone. Then it was shipped to be assembled devotedly by Hindu volunteers in London. Goats of all religions or none were duly impressed by this remarkable site of Hindu faith.

After a free afternoon, interrupted only by the snoring of other Goats, we all assembled for the **Group Photo** on the ISH Foyer stairs. These stairs were never designed to hold all observant and attending Goats at one time. Worse still, there were Goats who had been living too well and putting on weight since earlier Reunions. Tall thin Goats were at a distinct if unfair advantage in this operation, all three of them. But the latest in digital camera technology came to the rescue, as angles and apertures were adjusted so that all Goats, of whatever diversity, were included, magically made to look tall and thin, and twenty years younger for good measure. Everyone was also given the benefit of a pleasant digital smile.

I searched successfully for a picture of Lloyd George, the Welsh Prime Minister during WWI, whose nickname was the Goat. I have published much on Lloyd George, but I can't tell you why he was called the Goat, because some underage Goat may be reading this.

After Chartwell, we were bussed to **tea** at Chief Executive Martin Chalker's house, where he and his wife Ruth put on a lavish spread that went well beyond any expanded version of British high tea. By now there were no tall, thin Goats to be seen anywhere. Thank you Chalkers for this tremendous hospitality. Saturday evening was DIY, do your own thing, where the dress code was optional - for those who didn't go to sleep right away.

Sunday, the last day of the Reunion came all too soon. But it was full of business and events. First was a **breakfast for Goats Ambassadors**, a secret society of Goats who actually do things in their respective countries.

The AGM was followed by a tribute to Liz Ware, where speakers and members of the audience shared memories and our affection for this remarkable woman, whose wisdom and kindness touched so many of our lives.

Liz Ware was a true saint, an exemplar for all of us. Liz's death marks the passing of the generation that founded and nurtured the Goats Club and ISH. Their successors have a large mission to sustain.





GOATS REUNION INDIA


We enjoyed an evening trip for a Bollywood experience at the Kingdom of Dreams. We visited Agra where we toured the fort and Taj Mahal. We were very fortunate to have a private tour of the Palace of the Maharajah of Gwalior and saw a most amazing 3 ton silver carriage and huge banqueting table with a silver train set to carry the decanters.

In Mumbai we met fellow Goat Nandan Maluste, who led us on a tour of the city taking in the Haji Ali mosque, Banganga, the Malabar Hill Club, the synagogue and ended at the famous Trishna restaurant. Another Goat, Khushaal Talreja, arranged for a tour of the laundry and slums, quite an eye-opener, and then a twilight sail on a yacht to watch the Diwali fireworks.













We also visited several markets and shops where Jilly bought LOTS of earrings, now I was concerned she would exceed her return trip baggage allowance.

All our activities were superbly organised by Vikram, Nandan and Khushaal. We were never without comfortable and cool transport and there was always refreshment when we needed it.

We twice travelled to Gwalior by train, necessitating a very early rise, to visit the SKV Girls School, reputedly the best in India, and Vikram's alma mata, the acclaimed Scindia Boys school, located inside an enormous hill fort. At both schools we were entertained by the principals and given a tour. At the boys school we found the names of several Goats on the Roll of Honour. We were able to see the results of the students' excellent work. What was really impressive was the confidence, enthusiasm, politeness and behaviour of the students of both schools.

We were invited as special guests to both schools' Founders Day celebrations. At the boys school our cars followed the Maharajah of Gwalior's cavalcade through the town to the school. It seemed everyone in the town was out to cheer him on. Afterwards we were introduced to him and later he gave a very motivational speech to the gathering together with Mr Kunal Baht, the founder of Snapdeal, the Indian equivalent of Ebay. Both schools put on fantastic displays of music and dance and created wonderful open air settings for the events with lighting in the trees, colourful decorations, the vibrant costumes of the guests and superb food. Quite magical and never to be forgotten experiences.

One return journey to Delhi was by sleeper train. Vikram arranged our sleeping berths. Mine was an upper bunk which was very narrow and short, probably for a child. It was quite an effort to get into the bunk and when I did it was impossible to move and my head stuck out at one end and my feet the other, greatly amusing my fellow travellers. We visited the ISDI School in a modern Mumbai skyscraper. The school was established by Dr Indu Shahani to stimulate entrepreneurial skills. There was clearly great enthusiasm and

endeavour by the staff and students we met. We later enjoyed dinner at the Breach Candy Club with Dr Shahani and her husband, Ranjit.

The catalyst for our visit was the reunions to be held in Delhi and Mumbai. These were both splendid events. It was great to see so many old friends and to meet some Goats for the first time.

The Delhi Reunion was hosted by Vikram and Shobha at their home. Shobha had organised superb refreshment for the event and it was good to meet some of their family. Martin gave a presentation on the developments at ISH, the sale of MTH, and the plans to increase the number of scholars to well over 100. He also gave details of the Indian based ISH charity established to promote scholarships for Indian students. In Mumbai, part of a restaurant had been arranged for the reunion of around 20 Goats. Once again it was wonderful to see old friends and make new ones.

For our stay in Mumbai Nandan arranged for us to stay at the Royal Bombay Yacht Club located next door to the Gateway to India and opposite the famous Taj Mahal Palace Hotel. When we first arrived I was a little concerned because it looked so dated. Once inside I loved it. The place is a real throw back in time. The rooms were enormous and covered all the essential needs. The staff were impeccably dressed in maritime uniforms and were so helpful. It was a wonderful experience.

On 21st October it came time to leave India for our flight to London. Our bags were packed, Jilly's bursting with earrings. My cameras were full of thousands of photographs. My memory overflowed with so many wonderful scenes, people and colours and smells of this vibrant country.

The thing I most remember is the kindness of all the people to us visitors. If you haven't visited India you must go. Watching on TV does not come close to the real thing.

FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE MARTIN CHALKER



September is here and another year has flown by! Shortly after taking up my post in 2017, I presented a paper called 'Creating the Future' looking to set out the direction of ISH for the next 5-7 years. In this paper I restated our vision:

'to provide an affordable home from-home for international and UK students, supported by a substantial scholarship / bursary programme to give opportunities to more disadvantaged students, and reinforced by a social and cultural programme to encourage international friendships.'

This has started to come to fruition. In 2016-2017, we had 43 scholarships. This 2017-2018 that number went up to 90, and in the upcoming 2018-2019 academic year this will grow to 115. In total in joint partnership this will be just under £5M worth of scholarships. I want to thank Dr Sharon Bolton and her team for all their hard work on this. One of these new scholarships will be in remembrance of Liz Ware, who passed away in January, and I think is a fitting tribute to an amazing lady.

In addition to an increase in scholarships, there has also been an increase in the number of events we host, the introduction of free breakfast every morning for all of our residents, and a complete rebranding of International Students House. All of the teams at ISH have worked so hard on improving our facilities to enhance the student experience. Our mission and values are being delivered every day, in more ways than I can mention, so thank you to all our students and staff who make ISH the place it is today, and will carry it into

the future. I also want to pay tribute to Dr Geoffrey Copland who is our current Chair, following Baroness Diana Warwick's departure last year. Geoffrey, who has been a member of the ISH Board of Governors for the past 18 years, took the helm while we looked for a new Chair. It also gives me great pleasure to announce that Ken Dytor will take up the role of Chair of ISH from September this year, and Geoffrey will be staying on the Board until he retires in May 2019.

UPGRADES AND IMPROVEMENTS

As I mentioned we have had a busy year improving the facilities here at ISH: where to start? Firstly, we decided to upgrade and renew the Bar, now renamed 'The Thirsty Scholar'. This was officially opened by HRH The Princess Royal, Princess Anne on the 22nd March 2018, and is fitted with a pizza oven, café facilities, and all new furnishings. Then our kitchen, which needed a complete overhaul, was completed at the beginning of 2018, and allows our in-house caterers Baxter Storey to provide the best service for everyone. During the year, we started the project of upgrading all student bedrooms, which will continue over the course of 3 years. We also replaced all the bathrooms in our Great Portland Street building on every floor, and as one Governor stated 'they are hotel standard', which was our aim.

Many of you may have seen photos of the new lobby as you enter GPS, combining the two old receptions so we can see all guests who enter either door (we have opened up the 1 Park Crescent door as well). We have also replaced the toilets near the reception to reflect the high standard we want to portray within ISH.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS

I had the pleasure this last year to visit the USA for the I-House Worldwide Conference in Washington, where I met with I-House Directors and senior staff from around the world. We are looking forward to the upcoming year where our American branch of International Students House, FISH(L), will benefit in increased support in fundraising for our next American scholar. With the support of loyal Goats Vikram Mathur and Nandan Maluste, I managed to visit

both Delhi and Mumbai to meet with Goats during the reunions they so kindly hosted. We had a fantastic experience in India, attending the Founders Days at the Scindia Schools and meeting with Indian Goats, some of whom had travelled for hours to join the reunion.

I also flew out to Malaysia, where I met with Dato' Soo Min Yeoh in Kuala Lumpur, and attended the Goats reunion in Penang organised by May Lee Lim, Nari Bhullar, and their committee. This was a multi-day reunion that brought together Goats and their partners from all over the world and we are grateful to our Malaysian Goats for coordinating such a successful event.



LONDON REUNION

One of my highlights of the year was the Goats Triennial London Reunion at ISH this summer. Many guests have remarked that this reunion was one of the best ones yet and I want to thank all ISH departments for their support and for welcoming over 100 Goats back to their home from home. After the Saturday trip to Chartwell in Westerham, my wife Ruth and I invited Goats to our home to enjoy a classic afternoon tea complete with scones, sandwiches, and of course Pimms. We had several scholars come along on the trip and it was a great opportunity for Goats and residents to chat and relax in our sunny garden.

I look forward to keeping in touch with Goats, and with the changing data protection laws, I hope that you will all opt-in to receiving emails from us. 



FROM THE DEAN **OF STUDENT LIFE** DR SHARON BOLTON



ISH's residents and members enjoyed a busy and varied social calendar in the academic year 2017/18, with a growing emphasis on student-led initiatives, not just from our Resident Advisors, but from any student who wanted to pitch an idea to the Events Team.

WELCOMES

We held our first large Welcome Evening of the year on Wednesday 20th September. This was an opportunity for new residents to meet returners, find out about Goats, and learn more about ISH. The following week was "Get to know your RA week", where each Resident Advisor held a floor party to meet the residents they were responsible for and encourage the formation of friendships among neighbours. This year ISH printed new door name signs with our new logo, the resident's name and nationality to help break the ice between people living on the same corridor. The greatest buzz at the beginning of the year was generated by the re-introduction of free breakfast for all residents – a great way to get people together at the beginning of their day.

SCHOLARS

Our Scholars' Welcome Reception is always one of my highlights of the year. In 2017/18 we had a total of 83 scholars in house, all benefitting from tuition fee waivers or discounts provided by their university or another partner, and free or subsidised accommodation at ISH. I want to highlight new partnerships with the Marshall Aid Commemoration Commission, the UCL United World College Scholarships and the Karta Foundation, as well as the Royal College of Music. The latter added to our longstanding connection with the Royal Academy of Music and meant that we had a total of 9 accomplished music scholars in residence in 2017/18 (6 RAM and 3 RCM). The talent that we have been able to bring to London thanks to the scholarship programme has really made a difference to the House this year, not least to the Goats Team, who employed Musa Bwanali from Zimbabwe to assist with the 2018 London Reunion. We soon discovered Musa's amazing photography and graphic design skills, her hobbies while undertaking a Masters at SOAS in International Studies and Diplomacy. Another scholar from the University of the Arts, Ancel Daniel, an accomplished artist and sculptor from Guyana, created the most unique and amazing gift for our patron Princess Anne, when she visited the House in March 2018.



MARY TREVELYAN HARDSHIP FUND

This year, the budget available for the Mary Trevelyan Hardship Fund increased to £30,000 and to date we have been able to assist with small awards in 44 cases of unexpected financial emergencies for ISH residents and members. We have also received grateful feedback from students who were helped by the fund last year: one Royal College of Arts recipient sent an invitation to a private view of the Annual RCA Work in Progress Show, while a UCL recipient wrote "I just want to go back and say many thanks for setting up the fund and administering awards. Even though 500 pounds does not cover the entire school or living expenses, it was still a lot of money and helped me not to become too stressed about my expenses. Actually, I finished my masters program with distinction (I think I ended up being in the top 15-20% of students in my faculty) and was admitted to Stanford University in the US for the PhD program. [...] Therefore, again, thank you so much for the award and for the vote of support and confidence in my financial situation. It made a difference in my educational

REGULAR STUDENT EVENTS

Theme suppers were as popular as ever throughout the year, with over 120 residents gathering to celebrate Diwali in October, the Best of British in November, a Latin American theme in March, and ISH's Birthday Supper with Governors and Fellows in early May. Food, decoration and entertainment were spectacular on each occasion, with lots of appreciative feedback from our residents.





EXCITING NEWS! >> ISH wins!

The year came to an exciting close in September when ISH won The PIEoneer Award for the category "Accommodation Provider of the Year."



Our monthly ISH Concerts benefited greatly from the contributions of our music scholars and other resident musicians, including Julia Klimek, a Polish student from the Royal Academy of Music, who took the lead in organising these evenings with great style and professionalism.

Alexandra Petrache, one of our Resident Advisors, organised regular screenings of international films (including the Oscar-Winning Best Foreign Film, A Fantastic Woman, scripted by ISH Flats Resident, Gonzalo Maza). We have also enjoyed art evenings (exhibitions and life drawing. promoted by Resident Advisor Gemma Holzer), a new ISH Cooking Club and an ISH Football Team. There have been Banghra and Scottish dance classes, as well as a variety of Culture Club activities (Reggae night, Afternoon Tea Bus Tour, and a Manga Masterclass, to mention just a few) and regular group outings with the Theatre Club: to popular shows such as Aladdin, Anthony and Cleopatra, The Lion King and Harry Potter.

FLATS RESIDENTS

As well as enjoying a welcome reception, our Flats Representatives, Dave Blackman and Clare O'Keefe, organised Halloween trick or treating, a pre-Christmas lunch, and an Easter Egg hunt and tea party. We are particularly pleased that the ISH Family Flats have been selected as a finalist in the Best Specialist Accommodation category of the National Student Housing Awards 2018.



TRAVEL CLUB

With a boost to the budget, in 2017/18 the Travel Club was able to go from strength to strength, not just in the number and variety of trips offered, but also putting more resources into promoting the programme to ensure that as many trips as possible were fully booked. Day-trip destinations included Oxford, Cambridge, Thorpe Park, Bath & Stonehenge, York, Leeds Castle & Canterbury, Cardiff Xmas Markets, Windsor & Eton (the day after the Royal Wedding) and the end of academic year outing to Royal Ascot. Weekend trips included Wales (adventure weekend). Edinburgh, Iceland, Berlin, Prague, Vienna and Amsterdam.

DAVIS PEACE PRIZE

The Davis Peace Prize awards \$10,000 to students to conduct a summer grassroots project that will contribute to global peace. The summer 2017 recipients did a great job of promoting the scheme when the 2018 call for applications was launched in November. Rohan Seth, reported on his project distributing solar chargers to women in rural parts of Rwanda, while Prerna Rathi spoke about Peace through Service for Leadership, which was her project to deliver workshops in refugee camps in Lebanon. This sparked a lot of interest among our residents, who are able to access this USbased initiative thanks to our links with the I-Houses in America.

By the January deadline, ISH submitted five project proposals from different residents and two were successful. Jun Hao Peh has already completed Project Illuminate: distributing solar-powered lights to Rohingya refugees in Cox's Bazaar, Bangladesh. Sukriti Gupta will spend a week delivering personal safety workshops for women and children in India, to create safer neighbourhoods for the urban poor.

ISH AT CHRISTMAS

As usual, ISH excelled at Christmas, with a variety of activities: in early December, we held an Arts Workshop where residents decorated mini Christmas trees and drank mulled wine and chilli hot chocolate. Our Annual Senior Citizens Christmas Lunch was again a great success with 120 attendees. They were served a two course Christmas meal kindly donated by our caterers, Baxter Storey. The guests enjoyed playing Bingo, singing Christmas Carols and sharing stories with our staff and student volunteers. This year we raised over £2500 in donations, with thanks to all who contributed.

Our Resident Advisors hosted creative Christmas events such as Jada's Jumper Party where students gathered in the MTH Common Room to design personalised Christmas jumpers whilst sampling mince pies and mulled wine. 


In the last year International Students House has lost three senior retired members of the Board of Governors. Their work on the Board overlapped for many years and they all played a very significant and crucial role in the history of the House.

David Lawman

David Lawman had a very successful career in the private sector culminating as Chair of the Prestige Group, a major manufacturer of electrical appliances.

He was appointed as a Governor to the House in 1983. He remained on the Board until 2002 when he was appointed an Honorary Fellow. In addition, he continued to serve on the Finance and General Purposes Committee (F&GPC) for a further

David had great financial expertise and this was particularly put to the use of the House when he was asked to assist Michael Day in the critical period from Dec 1992. He worked almost full time for a nine month period in partnership

Together with Michael and other supporting Governors, such as Roy Rohatgi, Sushil Vadehra and Andy Tennant, they laid the basis for successful change which continues today.

David lived in Eaton Square, Westminster for over 50 years and he passed away in November 2017 at the age of 96.

Andrew Tennant

Andy, as he was known to everyone, was from a distinguished Scottish family and after studying at Eton School served in the Scots Guards as an officer from 1945 to 1948.

He had a career in financial services in London but retained a family home in Aberdeenshire until his death.

He joined the Council of Governors at the founding of the House in 1965. He served for many years as the Chair of the F&GPC of the House and remained as an active member of the Board until 2001 when he was appointed as an Honorary Fellow.

He was a very well respected and senior member of the Board and was

Frederick Pattison

It is with great sadness that I write about my dear friend Fred Pattison who died on 9 September 2017 at the age of 87. Fred was one of the original members of the Goats Club and knew and worked with the Goats and International Students House founder, Mary Trevelyan.

I first met Fred and his long time partner Steve Dimon during an Alumni trip to New York City in the early 90's where they lived. We had a great time and they introduced all of us to great haunts in the Village and other very interesting places in the Big Apple.

Fred and Steve would travel to London every summer and we would always meet up for a jolly dinner in my flat or Odins in Marylebone. Fred was a Librarian by profession and had a very strong faith and was a long term member of a church in the Village area of NYC. Fred also had a fascinating lineage in that his family had links to The Founding Fathers and the American Revolution.

Fred Pattison was kind, funny and a joy to be around. He was also very generous and made regular donations to Goats and International Students House. Fred and Steve were regular attendees at the Goats reunions in London and never missed the opportunity to meet old and young Goats.

The last time we met up was at the Goats Reunion in June 2015 which was a celebration of the 50th anniversary of International Students House. Although he was in poor health, he took part in almost all the activities.

Fred exemplified the values of ISH and Goats. I will miss his visits, great company and infectious laugh and our thoughts are with Steve during this difficult time.

Mr Master sadly died at the end of November last year. He was 92.

Roomi, his daughter, rang Jilly especially to thank ISH for all the friendship and kindness that had been shown to him over the years.

ISH meant a lot to him. He lived here in 1968. The last time he came to ISH was to the HRH Garden Party 2 years ago with Roomi. They both had a great time. Since then his health gradually declined and he died peacefully.

It is quite a testament to ISH and its influence, extending through nearly 50 years, that his daughter would make a call the day after her father died to thank all the staff who had made her father so welcome over the years.

Professor Michael Day

Michael had a long academic career culminating as a Professor of Anatomy at St Thomas's Medical School, University of London where he also held a very high position in the overall management of the Medical School.

He was the author of a number of books and publications including Fossil History of Man.

Michael was elected to the Council of Governors in 1983 and later became the Chairman at the beginning of the 90's.

He served as Chairman for over a decade and retired as a Governor in 2001 when he was appointed as a Vice President until his death this year.

In December 1992 the Annual Accounts were presented to the AGM showing a loss of almost 300,000 pounds and in the circumstances it was agreed that drastic action was required in order to save the House from impending financial disaster.

It was agreed to appoint a new Director and that management consultants be hired and that Michael would become, in effect an executive Chairman aided by another Governor, David Lawman, until the new Director was appointed and started. This process took around 9 months when Michael, assisted by David, worked full time to lay the foundations of change and

modernisation.

A new Director (Peter Anwyl) started in September 1993 and was given the clear instruction to continue this work. Michael continued as Chair for the rest of the decade and oversaw the success of the House. He continued attending meetings of the Governors as an active and experienced Vice President. Peter attended Michael's 90th birthday party last year.

His work as executive Chairman in 1993 saved the House and set it on a new direction for success.

Michael passed away in June 2018 at the age of 90.


